General Service Conference 2025

The General Service Conference is one of the ways our Fellowship comes together to share experience, consider the needs of AA as a whole, and help guide our services for the year ahead. It is through this process that a national collective group conscience is expressed.

We thank all Conference participants for the time, care, and thoughtful service they brought to last year's Conference. The listening, discussion, and decision-making reflect the spirit of unity and responsibility that supports AA across Australia.

The outcomes shared below are the result of that collective group conscience in action, helping inform how our services continue to support groups and members nationwide.

[Advisory Action 001/2025: 'Safeguarding AA policy document' to be produced as an educational animation](#)

The General Service Conference resolved that a video safety resource be produced, taking into consideration materials already available such as those produced by US Area 93 District 22.

[Advisory Action #002/2025 – Revamping the Australian PI Workbook and publishing it in digital format.](#)

The General Service Conference resolved for a new Australian PI workbook to be created and published in digital format and made available for download for free. That advisory actions 1996/008 and 1996/009 be repealed.

[Advisory Action 003/2025: Creation of a national, standard process for the project management of Advisory Actions](#)

The General Service Conference resolved for a Working Group of members with professional experience in project management, to create a user-friendly process for project-managing advisory actions based upon Concept 11 suggestions.

[Advisory Action #004/2025: Creating a new Australia 7th Tradition Flyer](#)

The General Service Conference resolved to create a Working Group to update the material in the 'Group Contributions Plan' pamphlet and combine it with relevant information in 'Money and Spirituality' to create a simple, readable, online flyer that can be updated regularly and provides groups with inspiration and information to carry out the 7th tradition.

[Advisory Action #005/2025 – Create a professional press kit](#)

The General Service Conference resolved the development and ongoing maintenance of a national standardised press kit, to be created, managed and updated by the General Service Office (GSO). The press kit should be administered and maintained by the GSO and made accessible through the AA Members website. It must comply with AA's legal, branding and communication standards and reflect the organisations core values.

General Service Conference 2025

Advisory Action #006/2025 – Updating the “AA in Your Community” pamphlet

The General Service Conference resolved for the pamphlet “AA in Your Community” be updated as per the suggested attached pamphlet and amended as per the Committee recommendation.

Advisory Action #007/2025 – Developing a publication for Housebound Alcoholics

The General Service Conference resolved the formation of a working group to explore the development of a publication featuring the stories of AA members in Australia who found sobriety, fellowship and access to service opportunities through online meetings and groups despite accessibility barriers, including chronic illness, disability, and caring responsibilities.

Advisory Action #008/2025 – Corrections AA Sober After Release Brochure

The General Service Conference resolved for the Sober After Release pamphlet to be produced in addition to the Bridging the Gap pamphlet and that the pamphlet refer to aa.org.au

Advisory Action #009/2025 – Australian stories

The General Service Conference resolved for the Australian story section of the Australian Big Book be made available online.

Advisory Action #010/2025 – Production of AI generated educational videos to support fellowship awareness and outreach

The General Service Conference approve the production and publication of short, AI-generated educational videos by the General Service Office to inform members, newcomers, and the general public about AA’s purpose, structure, and principles.

Advisory Action #011/2025 – National IT Coordination

The General Service Conference resolved for the General Service Board to explore options and create a plan around paid services to ensure security and continuity of Alcoholics Anonymous Australia’s digital assets and online services.

Advisory Action 012/2025: AA Guidelines for General Service

The General Service Conference resolved for the suggested definition, purpose and procedure in relation to Guidelines for General Service be accepted and implemented.

Advisory Action #013/2025: Office Staff Conference vote rotation

The General Service Conference resolved for the establishment of a fixed four-year voting term for the General Service Office staff members holding the single staff vote at Conference, with the option of additional non- consecutive terms where no other suitable staff member is available. The Service Manual to be changed to reflect this Advisory Action

Advisory Action #015/2025: Sunsetting of donation ‘clubs’

The General Service Conference resolved to discontinue the Birthday Club, Action Club, and 300 Club as official AA contribution initiatives, ceasing their promotion through all AA channels. While existing participants may continue to contribute, no new members are to be invited or encouraged to join.

General Service Conference 2025

[Advisory Action #017/2025: Removal of the 60:30:10 plan from service literature and endorsement of the Group Contribution Plan](#)

The General Service Conference resolved for the General Service Board to ensure all references to the "60:30:10" plan are removed from AA service literature, and that the Group Contribution Plan be referenced instead. Further, that the Board make a clear statement that the "60:30:10" plan is not official nor endorsed by the Board, and that group contributions are a matter for each group's informed group conscience.

[Advisory Action #018/2025: Increase in Convention Seed Money](#)

The General Service Conference resolved to increase the Australian National Convention seed money given to the Host Planning Committee (HPC) from \$10,000 to \$15,771.96 in line with CPI. REFER TO FLOOR ACTION #6 – Amend Advisory Action #018/2025 to include 'Seed funding to increase by CPI annually'.

[Advisory Action #019/2025: AA Professional Business Card](#)

The General Service Conference resolved for the General Service Office to design a professional business card (refer Topic #63) that can be downloaded by the groups and printed as required.

[Advisory Action #020/2025: Advisory Action Tracking Platform](#)

The General Service Conference resolved for the General Service Board to develop a searchable, online platform hosted on members.aa.org.au to record, track, and report on Advisory Actions and General Service Conference Resolutions.

[Advisory Action #021/2025: Conference Voting system](#)

The General Service Conference resolved to implement the recommended process starting Conference 2026.

[Advisory Action #022/2025: Amendment Process](#)

The General Service Conference implement the recommended process starting Conference 2026.

[Advisory Action #023/2025: Collecting Australian stories](#)

The General Service Conference resolved for the Board to commence collecting personal recovery stories from the Australian Fellowship for future use including archival purposes.

[Advisory Action #024/2025: Conference Theme](#)

The General Service Conference resolved to recommence the annual Conference Theme as a standing feature of each Australian General Service Conference agenda, acknowledging that the responsibility for its selection and publication now resides with the Conference Steering Committee.

[Advisory Action #025/2025: Auslan translation](#)

The General Service Conference resolved that a Working Group be formed to develop a plan for an Auslan translation of the Big Book (Doctor's Opinion - p.164). The working group will report back to Conference in 2026 with a detailed, fully costed proposal for an informed group conscience decision

Area B Lives & Breathes Again

My name's Derek R, and I'm an alcoholic in recovery. I'm also the freshly-minted Delegate of Area B, Southern Region; an area that has been in hiatus for around 5 years.

I was actually at the very last Assembly for my Area; the one where it was voted we 'go dark'. Only a non-voting observer, I silently sat on Zoom, watching the saddest single event I've experienced in all my years as a member. Voting numbers were very low, as were spirits. In truth, like a well-used paddock, there was probably sense in letting things lay fallow for half a decade.

On the other hand, that was 5 years when not a single group had a vote or say at conference. 5 years where the lack of our Delegate meant all sitting Conference members had to pick up the slack, and work just that much harder. And as a member looking for a triple legacy recovery, to be denied participation opportunities within AA Australia was more than troubling. Trust me, inventory was taken.

That all being said, the decision to not push for a sooner re-opening was an easy one. If I ever felt like twisting the hand of Area B members or groups, all I had to do was read the Step 3 section of the Big Book. We all know what happens to that actor running the show, right? Also, I'd studied the Concepts and Service Manual enough to know ours is a conference based upon pure democratic principles, with groups sitting at the top. If no group but mine wanted to participate in Area, then that's exactly what Tradition 4 and 5 would allow them to have.

Until, one day...

Someone in the second half of last year called for an online meeting to test the waters for interest in getting Area going again. That's all it took; a single, online meeting, called with the support and participation of our then Southern Regional Trustee David M.

And guess what? A few groups turned up! And as anyone who knows, it takes just a handful of members to create a new group – in this case, an interim committee charged with the single task of organising an election assembly. Cutting to the present day for a moment, that assembly was held in early December, with less than 10 GSRs in attendance. That's very much a minority of the overall groups in the Area, but well and truly enough to elect a committee and re-open things. Thank goodness for Tradition 4, which affords each group the autonomy to decide for itself if they wish to participate in AA Australia/Conference matters! Yes, we needed a few groups to want to do so, but we certainly didn't need a whole bunch of them.

Even if that minority of Area B groups never grows, this small number of members finally have the opportunity to exercise their democratic right to participate in AA as a whole. This gives them parity with those that don't, hence it's a most spiritual and equal outcome.

The election assembly itself was chaired by Paul, an ex Area Delegate himself. We did things by the book; and by that I mean the suggested format for an election assembly as outlined in the Service Manual.

Area B Lives & Breathes Again

It was, in my view, a most productive affair. Things were discussed and shared openly, and there seemed to be a lot of willingness amongst members in attendance. As a result, we now have a committee of 5, and we meet this week (I write this on Jan 12) to organise our first 2026 assembly in late February/early March.

This gives us a whole AA calendar event year to get set up for a great first conference in November. It was briefly discussed whether we fast-track our re-opening and send a Delegate to the 2025 conference. Wise heads, I believe, prevailed. Whilst Central Victoria has a District, thus experienced, knowledgeable GSRs, all other parts of Area B – e.g. Shepparton, Albury Wodonga – had none. We're therefore giving groups as much, rather than as little time, to elect GSRs, and for those GSRs 'to learn the ropes'.

Moreover, it really comes down to creating stable, engaging Area Assemblies prior to conference. It's not lost on me that our structure lists Area Assemblies, rather than Area per se, as its fourth level down. The assemblies are by far our top priority, and I have every faith the committee, and GSRs, will work hard to make them all they can be.

In summary, it takes just an acorn to re-grow a dark Area. One Zoom meeting, a month or so to advertise it, and a handful of groups with an interest to get things going again. It's been easy thus far, and I wish to thank the election assembly committee for doing such a stellar job of putting together a very strong first Area B election event.

There's buzz around, so maybe we'll never need to twist any arms. Attraction not promotion, right?

Modernising One of the Oldest CSOs in NSW

As with our sobriety – we change or die. The same is true of groups or organisations. Our thanks for the spirit of service and people who contributed those thousands of hours over the last fifty plus years to keep this service alive. Some share that the office started at the Trade Union Rooms on Railway Square at Wollongong Station in 1956.

The South Coast Alcoholics Anonymous Service Council was established in Wollongong in 1975 – one of two satellite offices under the NSW Service Council wing. The other being Newcastle. This CSO serviced this region and surrounds, such as the Southern Highlands, well. Many volunteers over the first 45 years extended the hand of AA by providing a walk-in office, answering phone calls, setting up a website, running local activities, supplying literature and supporting local groups.

By 2020 the world had moved on. Covid had come, volunteers were in shorter supply as they were for many good causes, not just AA. In the early 2020s, the Executive Committee started a process of reviewing the office procedures and giving the whole place a “spring clean”. By the end, 26 boxes of archives were packed (and kindly accepted by the National GSO Archive Team). Budgets were tightened to meet changing times. Financial and other feedback to local groups were improved.

Reaching Out for New Volunteers

Late 2023, the Service Council established a Rally Subcommittee to give newer enthusiastic AA members a project to focus their energies and be of service to the wider AA community. In doing so, the Council committed seeding funds with one CSO Executive member and subcommittee reports linking the Council and the Rally group. This dedicated team have worked diligently to create an experience that has not happened here for 20 years, the last one being at the PCYC in Ajax St Wollongong over the 24th to 26th March 2006.

Updating the Constitution, Incorporation and a New Name

As Bill W. notes in *The Language of the Heart*, when AA services interact with the wider community and formal legal bodies, incorporation can help protect both the public and those who serve. It provides reassurance that services meet regulatory requirements, while also limiting the personal liability of committee members.

During 2024–25, the Committee undertook detailed work to align the existing constitution with the NSW Department of Fair Trading’s Model Constitution. This ensured that AA groups continue to direct the service, while introducing individual membership and clearly acknowledging the AA Preamble, Steps, Traditions, Concepts of Service, and General Service Structure—leaving flexibility for future change.

Along with the constitutional changes came our new name – Illawarra and South Coast Central Service Office Inc. The application for approval was granted on 2nd July 2025. This is not an easy process. There are lots of administrative and other tasks involved. Changing name, even if only adding “incorporated”, forces lots of updating of all aspects of the offices functioning. Major ones are applying for a new ABN, new bank accounts, advising suppliers and working through re-applying for charity status.

Modernising One of the Oldest CSOs in NSW

New Premises

From its start in the early days, even upstairs in a pub, The Grand Hotel on the corner of Keira and Burelli Streets, in the late 80s to early 90s, the South Coast AA Service Council has had the benefit of a below market rental for the past 20 years, upstairs in an old building in Fairy Meadow. This location too served the fellowship well. However, with new ownership came the new lease proposal with the rent to be quadrupled. A six-month period followed by the Committee examining all options possible – of which there were few that the Council could afford.

The outcome was a very small office space, chosen because of its location close to public transport, centrality and parking for cars and again, budget. God's will it's hoped when only one option presents itself that meets those requirements.

Whilst it has its problems, members visiting the new office all comment on how cosy and inviting it is. Our office volunteers Tim and Deb have done a magnificent job in organising the space, adjusting to new technologies, such as being able to take credit/debit card payments from purchasers, and new office procedures.

Another Subcommittee – PIPA

At its November quarterly meeting, the CSO established a Public Information and Professional Awareness (PIPA) Subcommittee to broaden service opportunities and respond to changing ways AA information is shared. The Subcommittee's first task is a survey of local groups to help identify priorities for PIPA outreach.

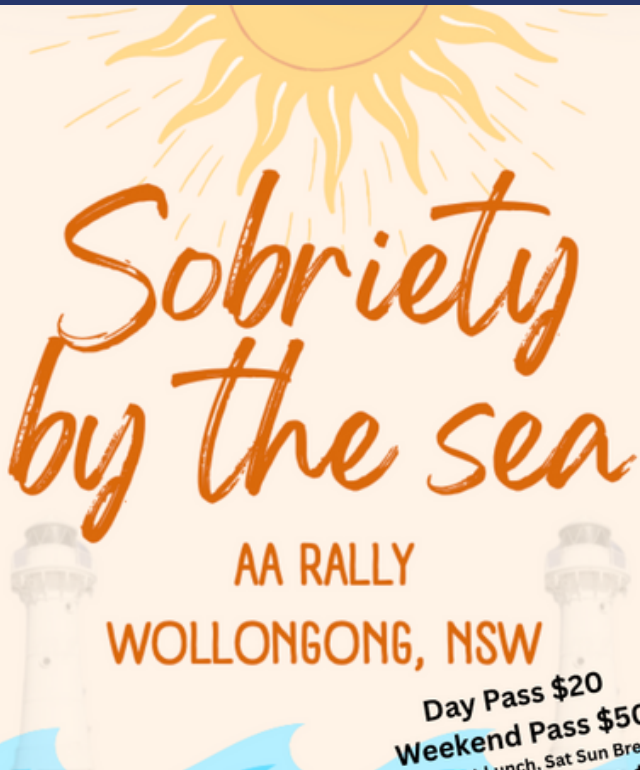
